

  - Will take place Spring 2023








## **School Climate Data Use Webinars**

**Restorative Practices Beyond the Classroom:** Integrating Circle **Practices Into Existing School Processes**

This brief was written while the author was living and working on the traditional and unceded ancestral homelands of the Kumeyaay (known today as San Diego), who have cared for the land since time immemorial.

estorative practices, which draw on the philosophies of global Indigenous cultures, contribute to the development of a positive school climate by centering relationships, participatory engagement, and a humanistic approach to discipline. Although restorative practices in schools are generally discussed in the context of alternatives to traditional punitive disciplinary measures for students, they include a range of both proactive practices that build community for the entire school and responsive practices that focus on repairing harm. The International Institute for Restorative Practices describes them as "an emerging social science that studies how to strengthen relationships between individuals as well as social connections within communities" (n.d.).

The ethos of restorative practices is illustrated in one of their core processes-circles. They can be used in a variety of ways, including community-building, problem-solving, teaching and learning, and responding to harm. The structure of circles creates an environment for all voices to be heard, particularly those from historically and currently marginalized groups.

While circle practices can vary, there are some common principles in how they are typically set up. Seating is nonhierarchical to






