Pay attention to the language and the organization of the RFA

Lisa's Tip

Set a realistic and

clear budget

Hilva's Tip

Check that all the required information is included, in a logical order



Teri's Tip

Behind every data point is a student, a classroom, and a community with a story to tell

Hilva's Tip

Consider how you use space in your application to meet the scoring requirements

Lisa's Tip

Be sure the data you are sharing relates to the story you are trying to tell



Grant Writing Tips From CDE Reviewers

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Teri's Tip

The strongest applications are those that reflect the authentic voice of the school and its community



Lisa's Tip

Consider sustainability beyond the funding you are applying for

Teri's Tip

Include perspectives and feedback from the implementation team for authenticity



Connecting to Your Priorities

Example: An RFA is available for "planning, implementation, and evaluation of activities in support of evidence-based, nonpunitive programs and practices to keep the state's most vulnerable pupils in school."

- What are your district/school/agency's current priorities?
- What do your existing plans (e.g. LCAP, School Plan for Student Achievement) include?








Connecting to Your Data

Example: You are looking for funding for a middle school with a priority to improve school climate and fair discipline practices. You see an opportunity to apply for funding

What data do you likely already have to tell





Types of Data

- Quantitative data
 - Focused on how many and how much; aims to count or express as numbers
 - Examples: test scores, school climate assessment responses, attendance rates
- Qualitative Data
 - Focused on how and why; aims to observe, understand, find themes
 - Examples: notes from focus groups with parents, interviews with teachers, or classroom observations











Needs Sensing Strategies

- Gather input from key interest holders
 - Methods: surveys, focus groups, interviews, listening sessions
- Go beyond surveys to make data meaningful
 - Analyze and synthesize findings, don't just collect responses
 - Use wonderings from surveys to guide additional listening





Needs Sensing Strategies

- Address common challenges
 - Low participation: simplify and incentivize input
 - Limited time: integrate into existing meetings
 - Data overload: focus on specific, needed insights





Telling Your Story

- Identify your school/district's strengths and needs
- Create a picture of your current activities and gaps
- Identify and build community partnerships

Planning for Sustainability

Example: You are looking to increase your parent engagement efforts, but your current funding has been allocated; you're looking to write a grant that adds to or enhances these activities.

- What is the full investment required?
- What gaps in resources exist or may impact this work?
- What opportunities for sustainment exist or could be cultivated?








Sustainability Pillars






Integrating Sustainability into Proposals

- Capacity building
 - Develop internal expertise (e.g., train-the-trainer)
 - Develop a system
- Systems thinking
 - Align funding with existing program or activity
- Resource leveraging
 - Describe how other funding sources have supported past work or current capacities
 - Identify current in-kind support
